St. Louis Marie contemplates all the mysteries from the starting point of the *Incarnation*, which comes about at the moment of the *Annunciation*. So, in *True Devotion to the Blessed Virgin*, Mary appears as “the true earthly paradise of the new Adam”, the “virgin and immaculate soil” from which he was formed (no. 261). She is also the *new Eve*, associated with the *new Adam* in that obedience which repairs the original disobedience of man and woman (cf. *ibid.*, 53). It is through this obedience that the Son of God enters into the world. The Cross itself is already mysteriously present in the moment of the *Incarnation*, at that instant of the conception of Jesus in the womb of Mary. In fact, the ‘*behold I come*’ of the *Letter to the Hebrews* (cf. 10.5-9) is the first act of obedience of the Son towards the Father, and is already an acceptance of his redemptive Sacrifice “on coming into the world”.

“*As all perfection,*” writes St. Louis Marie Grignion de Montfort, “*consists in our being conformed, united and consecrated to Jesus...* (*ibid.*, 120)

A Letter from the Superior General The Pathway to the General Chapter

TO ALL OUR MONTFORTIAN CONFRERES, WHO ARE CALLED BY GOD TO FOLLOW IN
THE FOOTSTEPS OF THE POOR APOSTLES UNDER THE DIRECTION OF SAINT LOUIS-MARIE DE MONTFORT,
AND WHO ARE SENT TO BUILD THE KINGDOM OF JESUS THROUGH MARY IN MANY COUNTRIES OF THE WORLD
WHILE LIVING AS FREE MEN (LIBEROS) IN FRATERNITY,

Along the way which we have travelled together in the years following the General Chapter of 2005, we have been able to observe the reality of our missionary presence in different entities. We have seen many streams full of missionary life, some tiring and painful pathways and some challenges to take up. Now we all are called to look toward the future, to shed light on the way that leads us to the next General Chapter of 2011, which, like all Chapters, must be a gathering filled with the presence of the Spirit in order **to express all the missionary vitality** of the Company of Mary and **to strengthen it**. It must be a gathering which recognizes our weaknesses and **sets out a way** to go beyond them and which looks at the challenges we need to respond to in order to revitalize our missionary vocation.

After a time of discernment, the General Council and I have traced out a path of accompaniment for the entire Congregation, and we want to invite **the Superiors of Entities** to share this vision by taking as a priority the task of **animating the missionary identity** of each confrere, of each community and of the entire entity. We are preparing for the visits that we will make in each entity so that we might walk together toward the upcoming meetings of the EGC in Fatima (May 2010) and the General Chapter in Rome (May 2011).

Our perspective, from all the connections we have woven together with you and from our missionary reality, brings us to a choice: to place our attention on MISSION, but from the perspective of the LIVED PERSONAL EXPERIENCE of each confrere called to follow this vocation, whatever his age, looking at the NEEDS of our Congregation, the Church, our people and the world today, and in light of our SPECIFICALLY MONTFORTIAN HERITAGE.

Allow me to compare our small and poor Company to a **tree** which is in the garden of the Kingdom of God which grows in our humanity. We have our roots in the rich earth of the Word of God which nourishes our faith and our missionary vocation. A profound and lively *Lectio Divina* is the source of our tree's vitality. The central root of the tree is the Word of God Incarnated in the Virgin Mary, the Mystery of the Incarnation which Saint Louis-Marie de Montfort has placed at the centre of our spirituality. Connected to the central root of this Mystery of Salvation are numerous other roots branching out. These are the great missionaries whom our Founder presents to us as inspirations for our charism: the poor Apostles, in whose footsteps he guides us (MR 2), "Saint Paul, Saint Vincent Ferrier, Saint Francis Xavier" (MR 6). Here is an entire missionary heritage in the history of evangelization which St. Louis-Marie de Montfort knew how to receive and appropriate for himself. Included in this heritage are the Montfortians who have gone before us, who have passed on the tradition to us through their lively involvement and their witness.

With this heritage, St. Louis-Marie de Montfort was able to make this tree grow in the garden of the Kingdom, this tree which is the Montfortian missionary charism.

During these past decades, we have had a rich reflection on our charism. *Evangelization, Mary, Availability, Acting Together* (the 1987 General Chapter) are the four major branches of this tree. From these *cumulative and necessarily linked elements* we continued the reflection to *Evangelize à la Montfort* (the 1993 General Chapter) and to *Open to Jesus Christ* (the 1999 General Chapter), which were appeals inviting us to return to the sources. *Walking Together in the Footsteps of the Poor Apostles* (the 2005 General Chapter) put into play a process of rediscovering a sense of belonging to the Congregation for a greater sharing of our spiritual and material resources, always in view of our Montfortian mission. We want to give a continuity to this process by having a contemplative and insightful perspective in order to know how to recognize the gifts and qualities which our Creator God has given to each of us and to see in all truth and humility how we can make the mission confided to us bear fruit.

The Congress on Religious Life, which took place in Rome a few years ago, invited all religious to be passionate for God and for Humanity. In the pathway that opens before us, we would like to have an animation and an accompaniment in order to mutually help ourselves, all of us in the Company, to rediscover the passion and enthusiasm flowing from our personal reality, the passion for the missionary plan of each of our communities, and the passion for mission flowing from the Montfortian missionary heritage.

The challenge will be to avoid writing another beautiful document on mission, and instead to be able **to recount** what the Lord is doing within us and through us and our communities in order to spread and give witness to the Good News of the Gospel among men and women who thirst for life and hope. In this way we can imitate the Apostles who came to Jesus to recount with joy the fruits of their actions (cf. Lk 10, 17; Acts 14, 27; 15, 12). We must also allow ourselves to be enriched by presence and observations of our collaborators, the men and women who work with us in our missionary activities.

Here are the three main steps which we are proposing: **to see, judge and act.**

SEE – VISITS OF THE COUNCILLORS AND THE ANIMATION OF THE SUPERIORS: I invite you to go back to some significant facts in your missionary life and to share them. What is most significant for you among these experiences? With that in mind: How do you see your personal mission? What is your contribution to the mission of the Congregation? What is the inspiration that supports you? What are the cries of your people to which you have responded? (*The General Assistant will be in contact with the Superior of the entity to clarify the process.*)

JUDGE – *LECTIO DIVINA*: in light of these facts, I invite you to contemplate the experiences of the Apostles, St. Paul and St. Louis-Marie de Montfort in line with our missionary commitments today. We invite you to undertake a *Lectio Divina* “in the footsteps of the poor apostles”:

- With the *Acts of the Apostles* during the Easter season this year,
- With the Letters of Saint Paul, as a preparation for the 300th Anniversary of the Calvary of Pontchâteau,
- Allowing ourselves to be enlightened by the *Triptych* (PM, MR, LCM) of Saint Louis-Marie de Montfort, by our *Constitutions*, and by all the texts on Montfortian mission (for example, the last general chapters).

ACT – EGC 2010 AND THE GENERAL CHAPTER OF 2011: We want to allow the richness of the sharing made in each entity on our mission today to speak to us in order to discover there the pathway which the Spirit wants to show us on the personal level of each Montfortian, on the level of the local community, on the level of the entities, and on the level of the general administration.

The mandate of the new administration of the General Delegation of India will be for three years, in view of its future change into a vice-province.

Meeting of the “New” Delegation Superiors

From March 2 – 22, 2009 the new superiors of the general delegation met at the General House: Dwi (Yoseph Putra Dwi Darma Watun) from Indonesia, Anthony Pereira from India, Paul Arnel Lucero from the Philippines, Louis Nkukumila from Anglophone Africa, Eugenio Cucchi Francophone Africa, Luciano Andreol from Peru Brazil, Orazio Rossi from Madagascar, and Manuel Peixoto from Portugal. Also participating in the session were Masjon Kenedy, the superior of the community in Papua New Guinea, and Juan-Francisco Pérez Alonso, superior of the delegation of Ecuador.

The first week was dedicated to **human formation**, and it was animated by Sr. Desneige, D.W. (from the General House of the daughters of wisdom in Rome) and by Fr. Pierre Bonhommeau, the provincial of France. We began with sharing about our doubts and our hopes in response to the call which we received to serve our Congregation as delegation superiors. The sharing helped us to get to know each other better. Through our discussions geographical distances seem to be reduced. Being together during these days gave us more courage and strength to serve our congregation. As those responsible for our delegation, we know that it is not possible to respond to the wishes of every con for and to be able to give a solution to all the problems. Misunderstanding and conflicts can rise up, and that is a part of our life. The one in charge will always be vulnerable. In our life just as in the lives of our confreres and community, moments of prayer and rest are important. They help us to serve the mission better. So in the storms of life we must be ourselves without destroying others, not letting stress get the best of us but always finding dynamics and different activities to overcome it. Father Jorge Enrique came to share with us his valuable experience in Haiti in a process of “restoring life” to people affected by the different hurricanes. During the final Eucharist of this first week reach changed with one another a paper on which we had written the qualities that we had discovered in each other this week.



The second week began with the presentation of the current situation in each general delegation. We were made aware that the future is still promising in our entities, from the Philippines to Madagascar, from Africa to Indonesia, in India and in Papua New Guinea, and arriving in Latin America while passing through Portugal. May thanks be given to God! Father Olivier Maire was with us for two days dealing with a rather fascinating subject: **conflict management**. Taking some biblical texts from the old and New Testament, we analyzed a certain number of conflicts and the processes used to resolve them. We became aware that, in the majority of cases, conflict begins with rumors, with “they say...” so to resolve these conflicts we have to begin with concrete facts, distinguishing between the facts and their interpretation. Generally, the first reaction to a conflict is emotional and even aggressive. Conflict finds a solution when we welcome the point of view of the other person,

and respect it. Then Father Ivo Libralato, with all the preparation and wisdom which he possesses, spent two days updating us on the importance of **planning**, which finds its origin in a prophetic spirituality and the spirituality of communion, which values the little one and the poor. He developed the spirituality of trust and Fidelity, of responsibility and hope, a spirituality based on patience and harmony as opposed to a "spirituality" based on success and results. Like good students we traced a pathway of good planning: the ideal (utopia), an analysis of reality, theoretical principles, diagnosis, the choice of priorities, a general objective, strategies, implementation and evaluation. The second week ended with a meeting between the delegation superiors, the participants in IMI and the members of the General House.

The third week was devoted to more practical questions of **management and administration**. On Monday and Tuesday (March 16-17) Fr. Frederick Scragg, the provincial of Great Britain and Ireland, guided us in an understanding of our "mission" as superiors and of the "delegated powers" which we have received. In reference to our constitutions father Fred emphasized that the principal mission of the delegation superior is to animate and to administrate; to know the confreres and to be a bond of unity among the members of the delegation and to be a link between the delegation and the entire congregation. The delegation superior must encourage the mission of evangelization and to help the coming of the kingdom of God. We had two days for studying and reviewing our Constitutions; that is worth meditating on from time to time. Fr. Don LaSalle presented an introduction to the Administrative Directory and reviewed some important procedures for formation and for communicating information to the General Curia. The 18th and 19th were devoted to **questions of finances and economy**: a study of the financial directory for the administration of temporal goods. The superior general's letter, temporal goods at the service of the mission, and the document "economy and mission in consecrated life from the point of view of a layperson" (Francisco J. Palom) were the heart of this reflection directed by Father Luizinho Stefani, bursar General. Among all the themes which consecrated life must certainly confront, that of finances is perhaps one of the most complicated because we do not succeed in seeing the relationship between the vow of poverty and material goods. Then, Father Paul Allerton and a layman, Mr Luigi Vincenti, gave us a more technical orientation on the different financial forms. They reminded us and will continue to remind us for a long time that we must present the accounts to the general curia in mid-February. This is for the bursars of the delegations. The local bursars must always hand in their accounts and their budgets. March 20 was devoted in part to the **pathway toward the general chapter of 2011**. This chapter will have as its central theme mission seen from the perspective of our lived missionary experience. For the second part of March 20 we listened with pleasure and great interest to the witness and lived experience of brother Désiré Rakotonandrasana from the delegation of Madagascar, and of brother Gilles Paquette, from the province of Canada, both members of the General House community. They invited us to continue our reflection on **the role, the figure and the mission of the brother** in each delegation in particular and in the congregation as a whole ...

This is an initiative which should be continued for the next group of superiors...

International Montfortian Institute 2009



On February 16, 2009, the General House of the Brothers of St. Gabriel in Rome welcomed the participants in the International Montfortian Institute 2009. The program will last six months, the last three of which will take place in France “in the footsteps of St. Louis de Montfort.”

Eleven Montfortians, coming from eight different nationalities, are participating in this experience. We include here some extracts from the “messages of welcome” given by our three Superiors General:

By Sister Louise Madore, Superior General of the Daughters of Wisdom:

Dear Participants,

For the past few months you have been preparing yourselves to live this important time of formation that is offered to you, the IMI: the International Montfortian Institute. You prepared yourselves to live the international experience through a serious learning of languages but I hope also through a preparation in your heart ... since it is only as long as the heart is open that you can commit yourself completely in this way of Montfortian formation, and that you will be able to profit of these six months of intense formation. (...) As for us the Montfortian Family, we have a rich spirituality and the responsibility to deepen it. We have the mission to convey it to the world. The first ones to benefit from this formation will be each one of you. We cannot convey anything unless we have first had the experience because we have to know at first.

I would like to recall the aims of this formation:

- To prepare and form a network of resources persons in view of transmitting the Montfortian Spirituality.
- To reflect on a new way of living our Montfortian Religious Life in the context of this world.

(...) I wish you all, following our founders to live with the whole intensity of your person this exacting but rich experience. Our prayer and our affection will accompany you.

By Brother René Delorme, Superior General of the Brothers of Saint Gabriel:

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

I am happy to welcome you to this “International Montfortian Institute”. The name of this Institute is quite appropriate. It is “Montfortian”, totalizing 26 participants from our three Congregations, and it is “International”, with participants coming from 12 different countries, and resource-persons coming from at least 9 different countries. I am also happy to welcome you at the *Casa San Gabriele*, where the session will be held all through your

stay in Rome. I wish you all to have a pleasant and enriching community life; a life characterized by unity and cultural diversity. I wish you to feel at home!

The animation team of IMI 2009 is nearly two years old. Sister Chantal, Father Enrique and Bro. Paulose have already put much time and energy in the preparation of this session. And they did so while continuing the regular tasks they are assigned in their Provinces. The mandate they have received from the Superiors General is as follows: to help each one of you to live this session full-heartedly, not only as an “intellectual experience”, but rather as a “deep spiritual one”. We count on each one to offer his/her wholehearted collaboration in all activities that will be proposed all through the session. (...)

By Fr. Santino Brembilla, Superior General of the Missionaries of the Company of Mary:

Dear Participants of IMI, Dear Confrères and dear Sisters. Welcome to all of you!

Sister Louise has presented the objectives of the IMI and the path that we will have to follow during these six months. I would like to emphasize the attitudes with which we must execute our journey.

The reading from the Proverbs (2: 1-9) has opened the beginning of this experience and it has given us some very deep enlightenments: the first attitude invites us to bring with us our own life in that road: “to make our ears attentive to Wisdom”, “incline the heart towards the intelligence”, “to look for”, “to dig ... as someone looking for a treasure”. The temptation of all these encounters is to prepare ourselves with our intelligence in order to understand and to know many things, but we have invited religious men and women with a certain experience in the way they have lived the life of our spirituality because we wish to encourage a sharing. We have to “receive” and to “give” through an immersion in the fruitfulness of our lives springing from our spirituality. It is very important, therefore, to let the teaching go from the intelligence to the heart, all that we live, receive and wish, to share, to be able to see life which is in us and to acknowledge it in others. (...) If we walk in that way, the text of the Book of Proverbs says to us: “then you will understand every path of happiness”. May the presence of the Lord’s life come to you and give great happiness. The main challenge in our world and in our interpersonal relationships is to pull down all the walls, the divisions, the separations that we live with and which do not allow us to share life and life in abundance. To give life, also through a way of the cross as Jesus did, leads us to the greatest fruitfulness because it is the fruit of love.

To enter into the message that Montfort, Marie Louise and all our predecessors have given us as legacy, it is as if we were diving into a river whose water increases every day to bring fruit wherever it passes. May the richness of our spirituality make our hearts fruitful and with this happiness we may become a multiplying element when we return into our entities to convey this heritage that is a gift from God to his Church.

Blessing of the cornerstone of the new SMM house in Zagreb

On March 7, 2009, the Montfortian community in Croatia experienced an important moment in its history on the occasion of the blessing of the cornerstone of their new residence in Zagreb. Monseigneur Valentin Pozaić sj, auxiliary bishop of Zagreb, presided. Others present included the Vicar General for the Army (two of our confreres are military chaplains), the local parish priest and parish priests from neighboring parishes and (need we say it?) our confreres. The Provincial Superior of Italy was represented by Fr. Marcello Baraldo, who placed the “parchment” in the foundation of the new house. The Superior General was represented by Fr. Olivier Maire, who placed the first stone, a very significant one because it came from the Calvary of Pontchâteau.



Cardinal Franjo Šeper, the former Prefect of the Congregation of the Faith, blessed the first Montfortian house in Zagreb on December 8, 1976. The first community was founded in 2001. The first Father was Fr. Luca Cirimotić, who died in April 2006. He made his first profession on October 13, 1973. Today there is a community of three fathers, Mihovil Filipović, Ivan Magdić and Zdravko Barić, still living in the little old house on the street of the “Holy Spirit,” Sveti Duh. A fourth confrere, Fr. Milenko Sušac, is in the novitiate of Santeramo with four Coatian novices.

The Montfortian community in Croatia is a part of the Province of Italy.

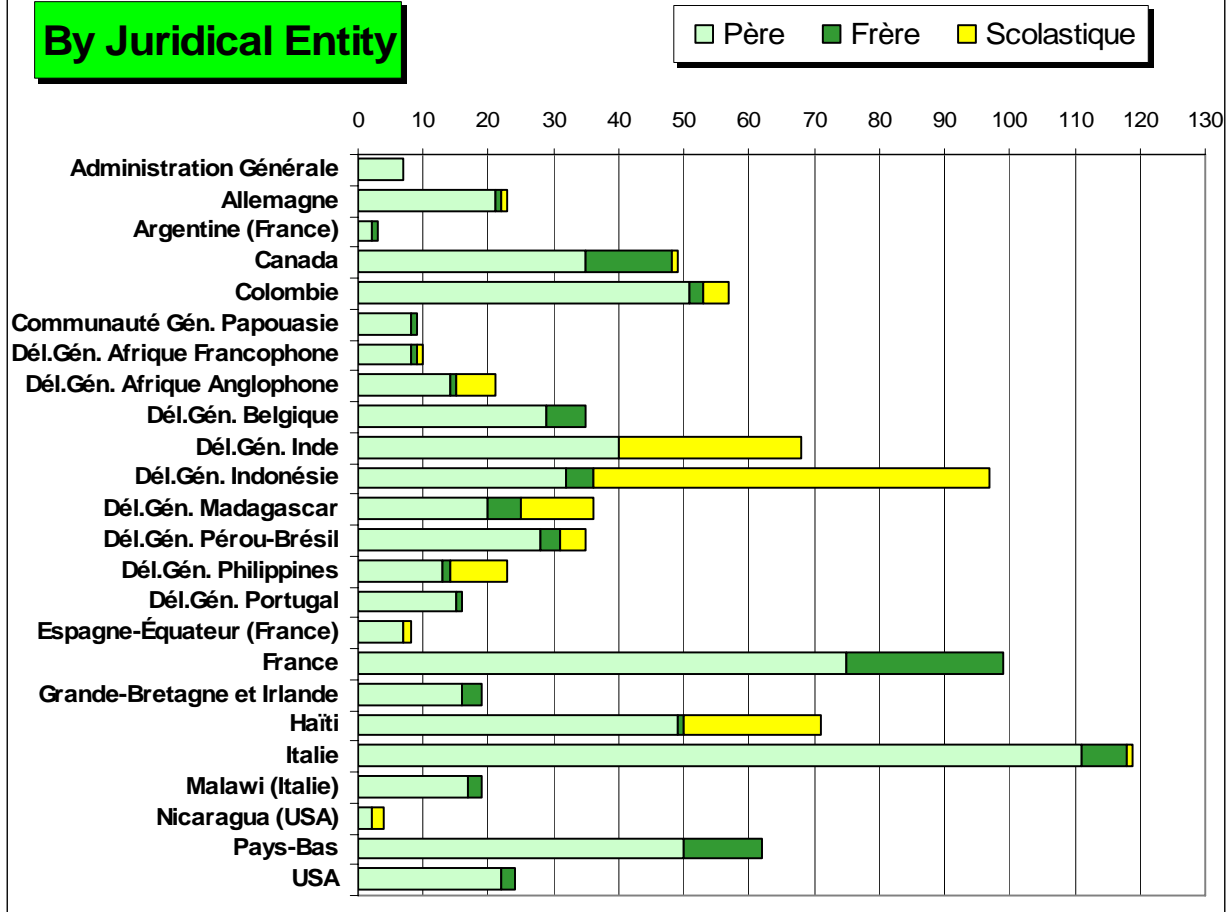

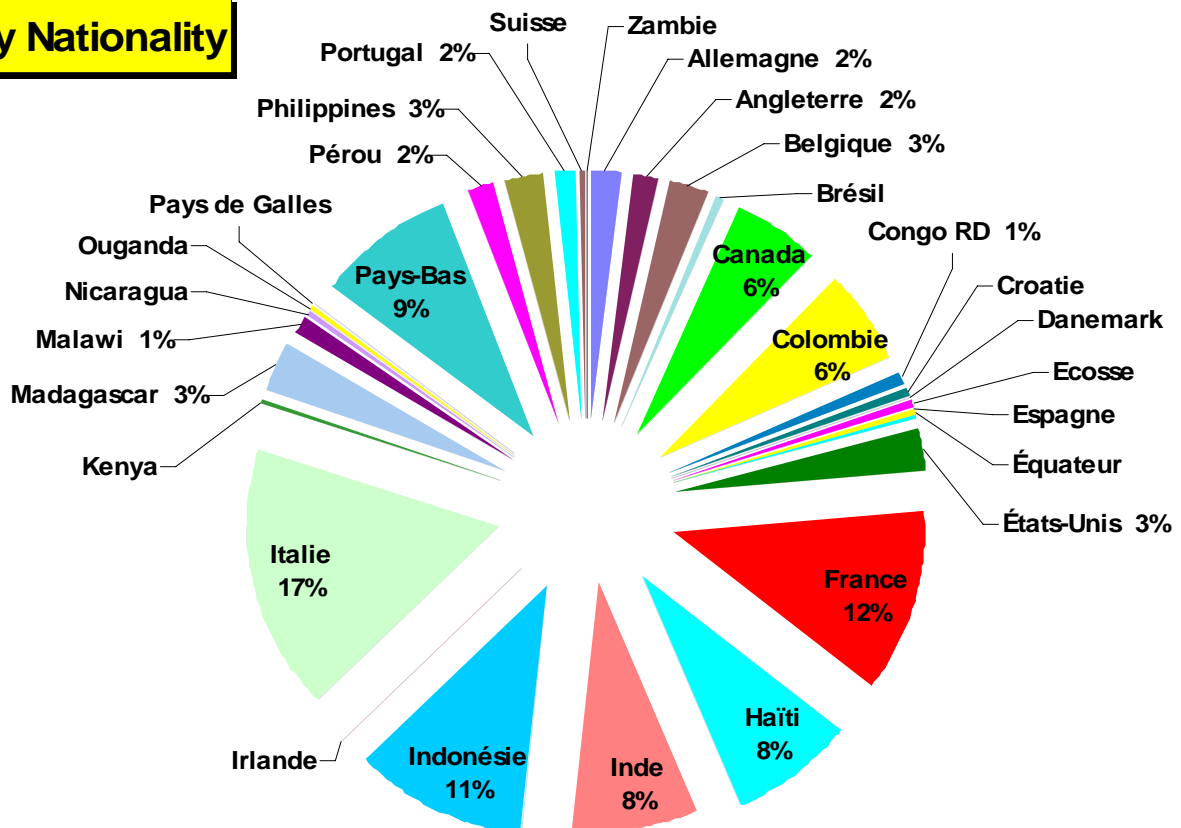
